

With support from 4-H leaders and the Smithsonian team, you will conduct research and interviews to learn more about your community and share your findings through a video project.

The Stories 4-History program runs from September 2025 - February 2026.

WHY STORIES 4-HISTORY?

WHAT IS THE STEP-BY-STEP PROCESS?

You'll navigate through a multi-step process to create a 5-10 minute video.









STEP ONE Choose an issu

Choose an issue that you care about in your community.

STEP TWO

Gather information about your topic through local organizations, primary and secondary sources, and interviews with local stakeholders.

STEP THREE

Edit your research and interviews into a cohesive, 5-10 minute video.

WHAT WILL I RECEIVE AT THE END OF THE PROGRAM?

All 4-H'ers will receive:

- A Certificate of Achievement for your participation in the program.
- A scored rubric with feedback from Smithsonian experts.

WHAT ARE THE OTHER PROGRAM COMPONENTS?

Throughout the program, you will engage in experiences with the Smithsonian and your 4-H community. This may include:

- A series of virtual and/or in-person meetings and workshops with your 4-H leader(s) to stay on track with the program.
- A series of virtual milestone check-in meetings with the Smithsonian Institution.
- Virtual engagements with 4-H'ers from other states/counties that are participating in the program.
- A virtual, culminating program celebration.

Blackberry Lemon Upside Down Cake

2 teaspoons melted butter

⅓ **cup** brown sugar

1½ teaspoons grated lemon peel

2 cups fresh blackberries

1¼ cup all-purpose flour

1½ teaspoons baking powder

1/4 teaspoon salt **⅔ cup** sugar

2 tablespoons butter on medium speed until well

Add dry ingredients to egg

3/4 teaspoon vanilla extract
